Executive summary

Portfolio Performance

An overweight positioning to and security selection within banking and brokerage, security selection within transportation, as well as tactical exposure to securitized products contributed to relative performance over the quarter, while FX strategies and an underweight to the government-related sector detracted.

Portfolio strategy

We remain selective on generic corporate credit risk and focus on bottom-up credit selection, emphasizing resilient issuers with positive rating trajectories and attractive valuations. During the quarter, the Fund selectively added exposure to names in the banking, gaming, and lodging sectors, including via attractively priced deals in the primary market during an active quarter for new issue supply. Conversely, the Fund trimmed its exposure to the tobacco sector.

All-in yields remain elevated compared to the last 15 years and yields around current levels have historically represented attractive entry points for long-term investors. In this environment, non-cyclicals, select consumer-oriented sectors, defensive BBBs, new issues, and potential rising stars continue to offer attractive opportunities, while ongoing macro volatility and recession risk may lead to downside scenarios in lower quality credits.




Quarter in Review

Credit spreads ended the first quarter tighter amid improved risk sentiment

U.S. investment grade credit spreads tightened by 8bps over the quarter to 85bps. U.S. economic outperformance relative to other developed markets was again reinforced by resilient prints in growth indicators. While the Federal Reserve remains on track to ease interest rate policies later this year, inflation has proved stickier than expected, causing yields to sell off as investors recalibrated rate cute expectations. Against this backdrop, the Bloomberg U.S. Credit Index outperformed like-duration government bonds by 0.8% over the quarter, with a negative total return of -0.4%.



On an excess return basis, all regional credit markets posted positive returns during the first quarter as spreads tightened amid improved risk sentiment. The Euro credit market outperformed over the quarter amid improving macroeconomic sentiment in select geographies, partially retracing its underperformance relative to other regions last year.



All rating segments of the U.S. credit market delivered positive excess returns during the first quarter, with lower quality segments outperforming as improved risk sentiment led to further spread compression. That said, U.S. investment grade credit posted negative total returns as spread tightening was more than offset by the impact of rising rates.

Market Summary

Security selection and sector allocation decisions contributed to relative performance

An overweight to and security selection within banking and brokerage contributed to relative performance, as the sector and select senior bonds and preferreds outperformed. The sector has benefitted from a supportive macroeconomic backdrop and the persistence of a high interest rate environment, with banks reporting another set of strong earnings over the course of the first quarter.

Banking and Brokerage

An overweight to and security selection within banking and brokerage contributed to relative performance, as the sector and select senior bonds and preferreds outperformed. The sector has benefitted from a supportive macroeconomic backdrop and the persistence of a high interest rate environment, with banks reporting another set of strong earnings over the course of the first quarter.


Transportation

Security selection within transportation contributed to relative performance, as select overweight airline issuers outperformed amid continued resilience in travel demand. In particular, international travel has continued to increase while jet fuel prices have largely been lower than expected, driving strong earnings and prompting more favorable forward-looking commentary from issuers.

FX Strategies

FX strategies detracted from relative performance, as tactical long exposure to the Japanese Yen underperformed versus the U.S. Dollar. Although the Bank of Japan began to engage in monetary tightening, marking the beginning of a return to a more normalized interest rate environment, this policy adjustment was well forecasted by markets, and the Yen continued to weaken.

Portfolio Outlook

Strategic Positioning

Investment grade credit fundamentals have remained resilient thus far as earnings as well as debt leverage metrics have remained relatively stable over recent quarters. Slowing consumer demand and margin pressures continue to represent headwinds for select industries and issuers, and tightening credit conditions remain a downside risk over the cyclical horizon. That said, given strong starting levels, credit fundamentals are generally expected to remain resilient even in a downturn. With respect to valuations, all-in yields remain elevated compared to the last 15 years and yields around current levels have historically represented attractive entry points for long-term investors.

Key strategies

Top Overweights - Financials

PIMCO remains constructive on financial institutions, and in particular large national champion banks, which are well positioned given their strong fundamentals following more than a decade of restructuring, de-risking, and de-leveraging. The sector has also continued to report strong earnings over recent releases, with strong net interest margins amid a higher rate environment feeding through to higher profitability and offering a source of organic capital generation. Our positioning is primarily focused on the senior debt of systemic global banks with ample capital buffers and diversified revenue streams.

Top Underweights

We remain underweight to issuers with limited upside and potential re-leveraging risk in sectors such as food & beverage and pharmaceuticals. We also maintain an underweight position to sectors with asset-light business models or more shareholder-friendly balance sheet practices such as technology. Similarly, we also maintain a more cautious stance towards issuers in sectors that are facing secular challenges to their core business models, such as retailers.

Top Overweights - Electric Utility


We continue to prefer U.S. utility issuers which operate in regulatory frameworks with timely, forward-looking rate setting mechanisms and which have taken steps to mitigate increasing physical risks. We also look for issuers with a defensive profile underpinned by stable or improving credit metrics and steady cash flows. Additionally, select U.S. electric utilities have also been benefitting from cyclical tailwinds, in particular from the incentives offered by the U.S. Inflation Reduction Act — mainly through tax credits aimed at accelerating the adoption of renewable energy and low-emission fuels.

Interest Rate / Currency Strategies

During the quarter we have continued to dynamically manage the overall duration profile of the portfolio, modestly increasing the size of the underweight position relative to the benchmark. Our positioning now consists of underweights to U.S. and Japanese duration, partially balanced by a small overweight to Australian duration. In terms of currencies, we are currently positioned with tactical long exposures to the U.S. Dollar, to the Japanese Yen, and to a diversified basket of EM currencies, funded by short positions in EUR, CAD, and GBP.

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Acronyms and definitions of investment terms used throughout the report:

Alpha is a measure of performance on a risk-adjusted basis calculated by comparing the volatility (price risk) of a portfolio vs. its risk-adjusted performance to a benchmark index; the excess return relative to the benchmark is alpha.

Average coupon is the average of the coupon payments of the underlying bonds within the portfolio.

Average effective maturity is a weighted average of all the maturities of the bonds in a portfolio, computed by weighting each bond's effective maturity by the market value of the security.

"Bend-but-not-break" refers to credits that PIMCO would not expect to default in a credit-stressed environment.

Beta is a measure of price sensitivity to market movements. Market beta is 1.

Breakeven inflation rate (or expectation) is a market-based measure of expected inflation or the difference between the yield of a nominal and an inflation-linked bond of the same maturity.

Carry is the rate of interest earned by holding the respective securities.

The terms "cheap" and "rich" as used herein generally refer to a security or asset class that is deemed to be substantially under- or overpriced compared to both its historical average as well as to the investment manager's future expectations. There is no guarantee of future results or that a security's valuation will ensure a profit or protect against a loss.

CPI is the Consumer Price Index.

The **credit quality** of a particular security or group of securities does not ensure the stability or safety of an overall portfolio. The quality ratings of individual issues/issuers are provided to indicate the credit-worthiness of such issues/issuer and generally range from AAA, Aaa, or AAA (highest) to D, C, or D (lowest) for S&P, Moody's, and Fitch respectively.

Dividend yield is represented by the weighted average coupon divided by the weighted average price.

Duration is the measure of a bond's price sensitivity to interest rates and is expressed in years.

Effective duration is the duration for a bond with an embedded option when the value is calculated to include the expected change in cash flow caused by the option as interest rates change.

Forward curve is a function graph that defines the prices at which a contract for future delivery or payment can be concluded today.

Fallen angel is a bond that was initially given an investment grade rating but has since been reduced to below investment grade status.

GFC is the Global Financial Crisis.

Information ratio is a ratio of portfolio returns above the returns of a benchmark to the volatility of those returns.

Like-duration Securities are calculated by the index provider by comparing the index return to a hypothetical matched position in the security.

LNG is Liquefied Natural Gas.

The **Option Adjusted Spread (OAS)** measures the spread over a variety of possible interest rate paths. A security's OAS is the average return an investor will earn over Treasury returns, taking all possible future interest rate scenarios into account. The OAS is the net spread over the swap curve that will on average be earned if the security is held to maturity.

Rising star is the term given to a bond that was rated high yield but has since been upgraded to investment grade.

"Risk assets" are any financial security or instrument that are likely to fluctuate in price.

Risk premia is the return in excess of the risk-free rate of return an investment is expected to yield.

Roll yield is the yield that a futures investor captures as their long position in a futures contract converges to the spot price.

"Safe haven" is an investment that is expected to retain or increase in value during times of market turbulence.

"Safe Spread" is defined as sectors that we believe are most likely to withstand the vicissitudes of a wide range of possible economic scenarios. All investments contain risk and may lose value.

The **SEC yield** is an annualized yield based on the most recent 30 day period. The subsidized yield includes contractual expense reimbursements and it would be lower without those reimbursements. The **Unsubsidized 30 day SEC Yield** excludes contractual expense reimbursements.

Tracking error measures the dispersion or volatility of excess returns relative to a benchmark.

To relate the price sensitivity of ILBs to changes in nominal yields, yield beta is applied to nominal changes to arrive at a price sensitivity of ILBs to changes in nominal rates. A **yield beta** of 0.90 implies that if nominal yields move 100 basis points, real yields will move 90 basis points. ILBs with long maturity may respond differently to changes in nominal rates than shorter maturity ILBs.

The distribution yield for monthly paying Funds is calculated by annualizing actual dividends distributed for the monthly period ended on the date shown and dividing by the net asset value on the last business day for the same period. The distribution yield for quarterly paying Funds is calculated by taking the average of the prior four quarterly distribution yields. The quarterly distribution yields are calculated by annualizing actual dividends distributed for the quarterly period ended on the most recent quarterly distribution date and dividing by the net asset value for the same date. The yield does not include long- or short-term capital gains distributions.
